## DESIGN FOR A FONT OF PRINTING-TYPE.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 15,684, dated January 6, 1885.

Application filed December 1, 1884. Term of patent 14 years.

*To all whom it may concern:*

Be it known that I, CHARLES E. HEYER, a citizen of the United States, residing in the city of Chicago, county of Cook, and State of Illinois, have invented and produced a new and original Design for a Font of Printing-Types, of which the following is a specification, reference being had to the accompanying illustration, forming a part hereof.

10 The character of this letter is of an elaborate but delicate feature; and it consists of capitals, lower-case, figures, points, end ornament, and catch-word "and."

15 A main feature of this letter is an inside diagonal ornament or scroll running parallel, which is crossed in the center by three short strokes, the middle being heavier than those on either side of it.

20 Another entirely new feature of the letter is the connecting of the ceriphs from one main stroke of the letter to the other and nearly occupying the entire inside space of the letter,

where is only one main horizontal stroke of the letter, as shown by capital letters A F J L P Y, figure 4, and lower-case f p q r. 25

The ceriphs of this letter are exceptionally long, and the corners are filled in where they connect with the main stroke of the letter.

The center strokes of capital letters E F H L consist of two heavy strokes running parallel. 30

An entirely new feature of the letter is the extension, diagonal bending down, and filling in of the main ceriphs of the lower-case, either on top or bottom, as shown in lower- 35 case c d f h i j k l m n t u y.

I claim—

The design for a font of printing-types, as described and shown in the accompanying illustration.
