DESIGN FOR A FONT OF PRINTING-TYPE.

3PECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 17,067, dated January 18, 1887.

Application filed November 5, 1885. Serial No. 181,968. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, GEORGE F. GIESECKE, of Leipsic, Kingdom of Saxony, Empire of United Germany, have invented and produced 5 a new and original Design for a Font of Printing-Type, of which the following is a specification.

The nature of my design is clearly shown in the accompanying typographic impression, to which reference is made, and has somewhat the appearance of a letter of the class or style known as "Missal."

The leading feature of my said design, as seen in the letters A, E, F, I, J, L, T, U, V, 15 W, X, Y, and Z, is a straight horizontal hairline having one or both of its ends upturned, with a swelled or thickened terminal. This feature is slightly modified in the lower-case, as seen in the letters b, d, h, k, and i of the 20 accompanying impression, which letters show the hair-line with the upturned ends placed oblique to the standard.

I am aware that a font of type having the

general characteristics of Missal is not broadly new, and I do not, therefore, desire to be understood as claiming such. My design, however, as before stated, consists, essentially, of a font of type known as "Missal," the letters of which type have the dotted terminals, as above explained.

I claim-

The design for a font of type, the same consisting of a series of upper and lower case letters of the class known as "Missal," several letters of the upper case having a straight horizontal hair-line with one or both of its ends upturned and ending in a swelled or thickened terminal, and several of the letters in the lower case provided with a hair-line with upturned ends placed oblique to the standard, 40 substantially, as described and shown.
